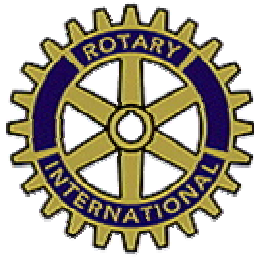

Gidley. Michael gave us an update from his recent trip to China as part of his involvement in the Parliamentary Multicultural Committee for trade and business in China. Michael also took us through the process that the Parliamentarians went through in their debate over Euthanasia and Voluntary assisted dying legislation. Robyn Morrow, Keith Kendrick and my wife Jude attended a thank-you luncheon at the Monash Children's Hospital last Thursday. The luncheon was to acknowledge not only our Club's contribution to the Hospital but other Rotary Clubs in our District including Monash, Clayton, Waverley, Glen Waverley, Wheelers Hill and Ferntree Gully. Debbie Shiels, the Director of the Monash Health Foundation, in thanking the Rotary Clubs present for their support also gave a short overview on what has been happening at the Hospital over the past year. Debbie also presented Hospital's latest fundraising effort namely the **'Imagination Appeal'** that was launched in October with the aim of generating funds for the likes of new medical equipment, research etc through the power of imagination.

### **Patricio and the wombat made some memories**

Patricio Soares will have a lot of memories from his time in Australia, and patting a wombat at Healesville Sanctuary will be one of the good ones. Patricio, 9, was brought to Melbourne from Timor Leste by the Rotary Oceania Medical Aid for Children (ROMAC) program for life-saving surgery at the Royal Children's Hospital. The surgery was needed to remove a tumour from the right side of his chest that had been identified as malignant and requiring four courses of chemotherapy. It's a tough gig for a child, and for Patricio's father Norberto who arrived together late on 17 September and went immediately to the hospital where the operation was performed the next morning. After three weeks recovering in hospital where he was cared for by his Rotarian host parent Dianne Sides and visited by Rotarians and

members of the Australian and Timor Community, Patricio was discharged early in October and commenced chemotherapy treatment. Healesville Rotarian, Graeme Chester, said as Patricio had become stronger, he had been given the opportunity to have different experiences, including a visit to Healesville Sanctuary with host parents Kay and Phil Leck. Mr Chester, a volunteer guide at the Sanctuary, said the Sanctuary had been very supportive of ROMAC over the years. Patricio and Norberto enjoyed a day away from the more serious side of life to spend a day in the bush. "They thoroughly enjoyed the outing, and in particular the pat and play session with ninemonth- old Gem the wombat," Mr Chester said.

**DISTRICT 9810 POPPIES PROJECT**

**5000 Poppies**

What began as a small personal tribute by two Australian women to honour their fathers who both fought in World War II, has become an international tribute of respect and remembrance to those who have served in all wars, conflicts and peacekeeping operations, their families and their communities.

Lynn Berry and Margaret Knight set out to crochet a humble 120 poppies to "plant" at the Shrine of Remembrance in Melbourne Australia for Remembrance Day in 2013 in honour of their fathers Wal Beasley (14/32nd Battalion — Australian Imperial Forces) and Stan Knight (Queen's Own West Kent Regiment — British Army)

It was this simple tribute of love and honour that sparked a massive community outpouring with an estimated 300,000 poppies collected from 50,000 plus contributors, with a number of major tribute installations in Australia and overseas, plus hundreds of smaller localised tributes throughout Australia, New Zealand and beyond.

To mark the end of the Centenary of Anzac and the Centenary of the end of WWI, on Remembrance Day 2018, the 5000 Poppies is currently working on two projects and we need your knitting and crochet skills. We are creating approx 62,000 poppies dedicated to the Fallen for a final installation at the Australian War Memorial in Canberra AND creating 50,000 Special Edition Poppies for the Victorian RSL Poppy Appeal in 2018.

## Lynn's Three Row Easy Crochet Poppy

### REQUIREMENTS

Red and black 8 ply (dk) yarn  
3.50mm crochet hook

Scissors, darning needle, decorative button for centre, or decoration of your choice.

This poppy can be started with either a Magic Ring or the more traditional chain start.

### METHOD

Using BLACK yarn, attach yarn to hook with a slip knot. Make 4 chain and join with a sl st to form a circle OR work round 1 over a magic ring – whichever is your chosen method.

**Round 1 :** 3 ch (counts as the first treble), 11 treble into the ring. Join with a sl st to the 3rd ch. 12 treble. Fasten off black yarn.

**Round 2 :** Using RED yarn join into the top of any treble from round 1. Ch 3 (first treble). Into same stitch as ch 3 work 3 additional trebles. \*work 4 trebles into each stitch\* around and join with a sl st. 48 trebles.

**Round 3 :** Ch 3 and work 1 treble into same stitch as ch 3, then \*\*work 2 trebles into the next stitch. Repeat from \*\* to end of round and join with a sl st. Fasten off, darn in all ends, attach centre of your choice.

Attach pin to back if required (for lapel poppies).

Poppy size should be approximately 6–8cm



## Ing's Hybrid Front Post Crochet Poppy

### REQUIREMENTS

Red and black 8 ply (dk) yarn  
3.50mm crochet hook

Scissors, darning needle, decorative button for centre, or decoration of your choice.

This poppy can be started with either a Magic Ring or the more traditional chain start.

### METHOD

Using BLACK yarn, attach yarn to hook with a slip knot. Make 4 chain and join with a sl st to form a circle OR work round 1 over a magic ring – whichever is your chosen method.

**Round 1 :** 3 ch (counts as the first treble), 11 treble into the ring. Join with a sl st to the 3rd ch. 12 treble. Fasten off black yarn.

**Round 2 :** Using RED yarn join into the top of any treble from round 1. Chain 3 (first treble), into same space as ch 3 work 1 treble, \*work 2 trebles into each stitch\* around and join with a sl st. 24 trebles.

**Round 3 :** Ch 2 (first half treble) \*work 2 (or 3 if you want a more pronounced frill) front post trebles around the next stitch from round 2, work 1 half treble into the top of the same stitch and the next one\* repeat around and join with a sl st. Fasten off, darn in all ends. Add decoration if required.

Attach pin to back if required (for lapel poppies).

Poppy size should be approximately 6–8cm



## Lynn's Easy Knitted Rib Stitch Poppy

### REQUIREMENTS

Red and black 8 ply (dk) yarn  
3.75 knitting needles depending on how tight your knitting is  
Scissors, darning needle, decorative button for centre, or decoration of your choice.

### METHOD

Using red yarn cast on 52 stitches.

**Row 1-6:** Knit 2, Purl 2 rib across row

**Row 7-9:** knit 2 tog across row. Where there is an odd number of stitches knit last stitch.

Cut yarn and thread through remaining stitches and pull up to form poppy. Stitch side seam and attach centre.

NB : The last three rows can be done in black yarn to form centre, but a knitted centre or button works equally well.

To make knitted bobble for centre... cast on 8 stitches, knit 6-8 rows to form a square, cut yarn and thread back through the remaining stitches and do a running stitch around the edge and pull up into a round bobble.

Attach pin to back if required (for lapel poppies).

Poppy size should be approximately 6-8cm
